'Disabling' WIRES

- 1. Verify radio is unlocked. To unlock—Long press #6
- 2. Press the F/W key (lower right button) then immediately press the 0 key to enter the menu mode.
- 3. Rotate the Dial knob to menu 23 – INT MR.
- 4. Press the F/W key then rotate the Dial knob to select a memory (d1 through d9) that is empty, i.e. it contains ••••• (six dots) = no tone.
- 5. Press the F/W key to store the setting.
- 6. Rotate the Dial knob to menu 21 – I NET.
- 7. Press the F/W key then rotate the Dial knob to select INT.MEM.
- 8. Press the F/W key to store the setting.
- 9. Press the PTT button to exit the menu mode.





Yaesu WIRES—A challenge to you (A repeat article from July 2024)

So, you bought yourself the Santa Cruz County ARES recommended Yaesu FT-60 Handitalkie. You programmed it to our frequencies. Then you start participating in Nets and events. And you try to transmit. Either you are not heard at all or the first part of your transmission is cut off. Net control asks for a repeat of the information but this Set" key, located on the bottom time hears a DTMF tone at the beginning of your transmission. Net control or other listeners may chime in and state the station (you) has "Wires" turned on. you want to enter Set mode and How did that happen? Very easily. Most of us have experienced this phenomenon with this radio. Yaesu's WIRES stands for Widecoverage Internet Repeater Enhancement System. It is an inter- encourage locking your radio net communication system that allows amateur radio repeaters to connect over Voice over IP (VoIP). WIRES uses DTMF signaling to connect, so any radio with a DTMF encoding keypad can be used to establish an internet link. When your radio sends out the DTMF tone, it simultaneously it's still possible to 'activate' the mutes your voice audio (or lowers it significantly). That's why Net Control and the rest of the Net can't hear you! When you are saying your call sign, the radio has muted or lowered your voice signal. Additionally, most repeaters automatically mute the audio when they hear DTMF

tones, cutting off the user. The person making the transmission generally has no idea this is happening other than a small, easy to miss indication on their display.

On the FT-60R, which uses WIRES-II technology (and not the current X version), the key that is used to turn on WIRES is the "0 row, second from the left (see diagram to left). Press it momentarily to turn WIRES on (or off). You might do this by accident if forget to first hit F/W key. You can tell WIRES is on if the small 'atom' symbol appears in the top right corner of the display. When participating with an event, we after setting your frequencies for the event and verifying the WIRES is not active.

If you do not plan on using this WIRES feature consider an alternative way of handling it by following the steps in the left column. After performing the steps, WIRES and the symbol will appear, but it will not send tones over the air and mute your audio!

Events Support the Sheriff's Office

Two events happened over the past month—continue reading for a recap of these events.



In June, Santa Cruz County's Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers were activated to support the annual Santa Cruz Regional Active Shooter and Casualty Care Response Training event sponsored by the Santa Cruz County Sheriff's office. The volunteers were tasked to monitor the perimeter and parking areas of the accesscontrolled training site, redirecting unauthorized pedestrian and/or vehicle traffic that may inadvertently enter the area, and reporting/communicating potential suspicious activity or other issues.

The event ran for five days, June 23 – June 27th, at the Soquel High School campus. The Active Shooter training is for law enforcement, fire, and medical first responders who may be called upon to face an active shooter in a crowded environment. The training includes live scenarios with volunteer actors playing the roles of shooters, victims, and panicked bystanders. The organizing of the event was completed over a few months. Equipment available to loan

Santa Cruz Communications Support have made **FOUR** kits available for loaning to allow ham operators participate in a deployment or to trial a different setup. Two kits are for a vehicle deployment and includes mobile dual-band radio, mag mount antenna, battery and kneeboard. The other two kits are for stationary outdoor deployments and includes the vehicle kit with additional supplies of a tripod antenna, lighting, and pop-up. John, N6QX; Dan, N6RJX; John, CERT Planning Chief; Lynn, CERT This included scenario initiation Logistics Chief; and JoMarie, KM6URE, CERT Operations and Logistics Deputy were included in the planning.

This was the first time using the Soquel High school campus location and it encompassed a modest sized footprint of perimeter monitoring. Prior years the event had been at Scotts Valley High School, SLV Tri-campus, Aptos High School and UCSC. Also similar to last year, there were additional activities ongoing during the same time as the event at the campus location. This included Alternative Education Summer School, and a multitude of athletic activities. Radio communications were via MURs and public safety radios. Health and welfare check for each volunteer on site were completed at least every half hour by a designated radio operator. The Active Shooter event logistics coordinator provided additional communications via the public safety radio to the posts and acknowledged

through MURs to the shift lead. and cessation.

After signing in and a briefing by the shift lead, the perimeter monitor volunteers were sent to one of six locations. The 4-hour shifts overlapped to allow time for the briefing and transition of volunteers at each of the posts. Sheriff officers in a roving utility vehicle augmented the perimeter monitoring posts. Augmenting one post this year was a mob of sheep, hired to complete a weed eating campaign. It was the most requested post by our volunteers and stories of the various activities were shared frequently - two kids practicing their head butts and rams asserting their territory. Most days were in the mid – to high 70s and with an afternoon breeze. Each post had a pop-up with weights and a few supplies. There was a total of 448 hours of service by 44 volunteers over the entire event. Many of the volunteers have dual citizenship with both CERT and ARES. Continued on Page 6

And because of this, it is difficult to state the exact hours were provided by each of the groups. The average number of shifts worked by a volunteer was two. This was the first activation for several of the volunteers and thought it was a very rewarding activity.

Many returning volunteers reported enjoying themselves more at this campus because of the various activities it presented at the posts. We had many interactions with the public explaining the purpose and length of the campus closure. But also enjoying the various aspects of the flora and fauna. There was a great sense of purpose in this activation.

The first Friday of July was another activation of ARES to support the Aptos 4th of July Parade. The fifteen volunteers were tasked to monitor the crowd and roadways along nine positions of the parade route under the direction of the Sheriff's Office. New this year was the deployment of large buses at either end of the route to identify the road closure and to mitigate any possible threat of spurious vehicle traffic to cause crowd harm. Communications was accomplished via Handi-talkies on a simplex channel in connection with a crossband repeater. The net control post was also monitoring the Sheriff's Office Red to allow situational awareness. The greatest challenge, also experienced in prior years, was managing the traffic after the parade has ended. This is a short event but rewarding to help support the Sheriff's Office.

- CLUBS: You are encouraged to join the local clubs, <u>K6BJ.org</u> (Santa Cruz) and <u>https://</u> www.slvarc.org/ (San Lorenzo Valley). You will meet other ham radio operators and learn a lot from them! Their websites offer when they have their monthly meetings.
- 3. SOCIAL/EDUCATIONAL: Many ARES members are also members of local clubs, so we "mix and match".
 - The Santa Cruz club invites all hams to join them at https://www.loftcoffeeshop.com/ on Wednesday mornings from 10-12. No Agenda - just meet, talk and learn from each other.
 - The SLV club invites all to meet every Wednesday as well up in Ben Lomond from around 11:30 to 1:30 at <u>https://www.coffeenine.com/</u>.
 - CAKE (Caffeine Assisted Knowledge Exchange) is held for everyone on the 2nd and 4th Saturday mornings at Loft Coffee. Some folks bring projects to share and discuss, and others listen in, ask questions and learn. You are welcome to join in any of these gatherings.
- 4. FREQUENCIES: We recommend that you program the ARES Frequency list of repeaters and simplex frequencies to your radios. <u>https://</u>xczcomm.com/index.php/frequency-list/ If you don't know how to do this, there are many folks willing to help and program recommended radios for you. To find someone to program your radio, you can go to the Loft Coffee meetings mentioned above, or contact our new member coordinator, Bob Fike at Bob@slvares.org.

- 6. NETS: nets are one of the ways that we practice

our radio skills, connect with other hams and learn things like being "net control". We have a radio net on the K6BJ 2m repeater and/or WR6AOK repeater weekly. These repeaters are linked on Allstar so that you can monitor/talk on either one and it transmits on the other. We are currently considering changing the schedule a bit and will keep everyone posted if this happens. The net schedule is on our website here: https:// xczcomm.com/index.php/calendar-of-nets/ You will also get a reminder each week about the Nets if you are on the mailing list. - 7. MEETINGS: We have ARES monthly meetings which are held in person at the Santa Cruz County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) on the 3rd Wednesday of the month from 7 - 9 pm. If you are on the mailing list, you will receive notifications about these meetings. The meeting is a combination of information exchange, trainings, practical exercises and opportunities to meet each other and get a radio programmed, if needed. The SCC EOC is located at the Sheriff's Office Building, 5200 Soquel Avenue at Chanticleer and Soquel on the 2nd floor. Entrance is from the door on the Chanticleer side of the building, which is always locked, so please arrive early so that the door monitor can let you in. If you are late, try calling on the K6BJ 2m repeater. Don't be late!
- 8. EVENTS: We have several opportunities a year to practice our skills in person during bicycle and other race events as well as support for public safety. You do not need to be a seasoned ham operator to participate in these events, as you will receive instruction and partner with someone who is able to show you the ropes. We highly encourage you to take part in any of these events. Some events require a DSW card and that would be indicated on the sign-up list. So you would need to be Level 1 or above to participate.
